

John Morrison Clarke (29 July 1948 – 9 April 2017)



Comedian / satirist, John Clarke, died while bushwalking with his family 9th April 2017. For many years he was probably best known for the long running series, Clarke and Dawe, with Bryan Dawe. These went to air on the ABC once a week, but John Clarke would be working on several at once. They would film two each week and then decide which would go to air.

The final episode was filmed at the ABC studios, Southbank, on 5th April, only days before Clarke's death. The previously unseen sketch has been released with permission from Clarke's family and Bryan Dawe. It can be viewed on line by searching 'John Clarke' or 'Clarke and Dawe'.

In this final episode, Clarke plays a National Broadband Network employee discussing neologisms. It starts:-

"A neologism, Bryan, is simply a term, or a word, or a phrase which has come into the language fairly recently" Clarke says.

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Garden Daze

The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago - the next best time is now



From time to time gardens need to be thinned out by removing old, diseased or unsatisfactory trees and shrubs. Sometimes as the years sneak by, we tend to take our gardens for granted and fail to see the badly overgrown, untidy, and straggly trees and shrubs. Some of these plants, which seem to have lost much of their early vitality, can be rejuvenated by careful pruning or re-siting.

When I read these words of gardening wisdom from Peter Cundall in my copy of the *Practical Australian Gardener*, I thought that he must have been visiting lately.

Having somewhat neglected my front garden over the past few years - It has become crowded and overgrown.

In anticipation of our move to the country - I had cuttings and plants in pots to get a new garden up and running. So planting out in all the space of a former empty paddock, I had put things quite close together. It took a bit to "get going". The worst grasshopper plague that I have seen here so far - culled a fair number of the new plants - then there was the what I used to call "*Wheatie Day*" when the hot north winds, sometime in November, would come unimpeded across the paddocks and turn the leaves of my newly planted garden into crisp brown "wheaties". It was also bit of an eye-opener to discover that the water here isn't as wet as it was in the Dandenongs! Gradually tho - over the years - things grew bigger and eventually created their own protection and micro climate.

So imagine my surprise a couple of weeks ago when looking through some old photos I realised that *Sleeping Beauty's Overgrown Garden* and mine had a lot in common. Good heavens - how did this happen!

According to Peter C - *Transforming an old garden into a new one is one of the most exciting and satisfying of all landscaping operations. At the end of each day's work the changes can be quite dramatic.*

(hmmm but will I like it?)

There are many reasons why plants gradually lose their vigour and ability to produce good displays of blooms. Excessive competition from more aggressive, dominant shrubs or trees is one of the most common reasons. (not to mention those sneaky briar roses)

Reorganising a garden is one job that is suited to early winter, as almost any plant can be moved to a new position, whether evergreen or deciduous.



Here are some simple ways to get started.

(One) Walk through the Garden and mark every plant you dislike or has been unsatisfactory. Then get rid of them by grubbing them out and carting them away.

(Two) Have a good look at what's left - if two or more plants are competing for space and light, choose which should be removed altogether and which should be transplanted to another spot.

Some plants can be transplanted even if they have been growing in the one place for many years - rhododendrons, azaleas, camellias, dwarf and medium sized conifers, ericas, most deciduous trees and shrubs. The main characteristic of many of these plants which can be moved from one place to another without major setback, is the tight, compact root ball of the evergreens and the easily arranged bare roots of the deciduous plants in winter.



Plants which do not transplant well

(unless they have been recently planted) are - many Australian natives, all brooms, cistus, ceanothus, laburnum, established roses, podalyria, nerium and very old climbers such as wisteria.

(Three) - Clearing done - time to try something new - now that the sun is shining into areas that haven't seen sunlight for years there is the opportunity for trying something new. Maybe some flowering natives to feed the birds and bees, or maybe the flowering shrub you saw on the gardening show last week. Bulbs can be another good choice to bring some colour into the winter garden - nerines, lilies, freesias, daffodils and jonquils.

(Four) - The Lawn - Lawns according to Peter C - are best left open. The occasional shrub struggling because of the competition of the surrounding grass could be removed to a garden bed. (Makes mowing easier - also (Peter Z should be so lucky)). Shaping an old lawn even if only by cutting off any sharp corners and developing gentle, flowing curves will have the double advantage of making the garden appear more spacious and interesting, while eliminating corners - again - easier mowing.

(Five) - Results - at first - An open slightly devastated looking garden. This is when a dressing of blood and bone with 10% potash added spread over the garden will help get things moving. (And give your dog an interesting aroma!)

...Then - the next couple of years - forgotten bulbs and erstwhile overshadowed perennials and shrubs will have resurfaced and started to flourish. A leafy, shady, but pleasantly dull garden will have been returned to its youthful vitality.

All I need is the strength and endurance I had about 30 years ago and I'm right!



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

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Apostrophe Explanations

1. *It's better to give than to receive.* ["It's" is a contraction for "it is."]
2. *We always throw a big party on my mother's birthday.* [The apostrophe indicates possession: "the birthday of my mother." "Mother" is singular, so an apostrophe and an "s" are added.]
3. *There are three pieces of pie left.* [In this case, "there" is an expletive — it doesn't indicate possession (their) or a contraction (they are). "Pieces" is simply the plural of "piece" and does not require an apostrophe.]
4. *Jim's teacher said that you're wrong.* ["Jim's teacher" is another way of saying "the teacher of Jim." "Jim" is singular, so the possessive is made by adding an apostrophe and "s."]
5. *She could never finish one of Dickens's novels.* ["Dickens" is singular; therefore, an apostrophe and "s" are added to make it possessive.]
6. *The dog growled and bared its fangs.* [Here, "its" is possessive: "the fangs of the dog." Possessive pronouns do not include apostrophes.]
7. *The boy's father said the baseball was his son's, but we knew it was ours.* [Both "boy's" and "son's" are singular possessive forms (adding apostrophe and "s" to the singular noun). "Ours" is a possessive pronoun and thus does not include an apostrophe.]
8. *The Simpsons' television is a central part of their lives.* ["Simpsons" is plural. Therefore an apostrophe is added after the "s" that's already there.]
9. *The sky's the limit.* ["Sky's" is a contracted version of "sky is."]
10. *After three days' worth of work, they completed the project.* [The rules for this type of expression follow those for forming possessives. "Days" is plural, so an apostrophe follows the existing "s."]



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SOCIAL EVOLUTION (part two)

To continue on from last month with my interest and observations about social evolution:

While Facebook, social media and the internet as a whole is a wonderful new tool for knowledge and social connectivity it is also a labyrinth for some of the worst characteristics of humanity. Fortunately on Facebook there is the usual family news and birthdays plus chortling babies and the antics of cats and reckless youths to provide comic relief and inspiration.

The internet has taken the world by storm and we are experiencing valuable new ways of communicating as well as the struggle to cope with online criminals, incomplete rules of etiquette and examples of personal abuse. Compared to village life of the past, when our etiquette was formed by mainly face to face interaction over many generations, we can now interact worldwide and from the relative safety and anonymity of the digital device. Modern "codes of conduct" are a "work in progress" with the internet because it was the media savvy young who captured the social media territory well before adults and especially the elders. As more of the elders enter the social media world their influence should temper the impulsiveness and immaturity of youth. Grandparents joke about needing their grandchildren to show them how to navigate the computer and this highlights the fact that, probably for the first time in human history, even the very young have assumed a level of power over their able bodied elders, (and that is not to suggest that they will abuse it.)

We don't allow youngsters to drive vehicles or take heavy responsibilities until they are reasonably mature. The *freedom* to drive is not a right to be taken without *responsibility*, they are the two sides of one coin. Even the macho world of Aussie Rules is gradually being forced to incorporate conduct codes to encourage discipline and respectful behaviour. The day may come when one needs a licence to log onto the computer!
