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TATONG HONOR BOARD

Extract from *Benalla Standard* (Vic), Friday 15 October 1920, page 3.



“On Saturday afternoon last there was a large gathering assembled at the Tatong Hall to witness the unveiling of the Honor Board. The Chairman (Mr. H.J. Wallace), after the National Anthem had been sung, stated that he was sorry that Cr. Dallas had at the last minute been prevented from attending by illness. He also had letters from Cr. Ginnivan, Mr. F.J. Green, B.A. (Inspector of Schools), and Messrs. W.B. Smith, M. Bilham, W. Worrall and M. O’Callaghan.

The Chairman in a short speech referred to the object of their gathering together that day, and expressed pleasure in seeing so many present..... Cr. T. F. Harrison, J.P., was then called on, and expressed his great pleasure at being requested by the committee to assist in the unveiling of the Honor Board. He spoke strongly of the good work our soldiers had done for us at the front, and how they had kept us free from German aggression. He advised the children to take notice of the Honor Board, and remember the noble sacrifice these men had made for us.

Cr. Harrison then called upon Mrs. Sullivan and Miss Daly to unveil the Honor Board, which was draped with the Union Jack and the Australian flag.

He next read the names of those who had fallen, viz., J. W. Bilham, G. Davison, P. Brennan and R.W. Daly, the audience bowing their heads for a few minutes.

The remainder of the names were then read, as follows:- F.M. Daly, J.H. Sullivan, A.G. Wallace, J.P. Sullivan, J. Stubbs, D. Campbell, G. Cox, W. Davison, T. Evans, H. Stubbs, G. Wilson, P.B. Payne, P. Joyce, K. Drummond, W. Brown, R. Davison, W.J. Hamilton, E.J.B. Cox, K. McIntosh, J. Drummond, T.J. Daly, M.A. Share, V. Worrall, A. Nusser and M. Seibert.”

Also, *G.J. Hammond (*killed in action), and H.B. Bickerton, J.J. Bickerton, J.W. Rigbye.

Anzac Day – What does it mean to Me?

I have waded in the sea where the Anzac Soldiers landed, and walked up to the beach - and stopped – and looked at the nondescript, but very peaceful place, called Anzac Cove.

As I waded through the gentle waves to the beach, over the open space that saw so many lives lost and shattered, and looked at the hills behind, I paused, and wondered why the Diggers stayed. The almost certain death – being wounded – watching it happen all around them – having to kill the enemy – yet - they stayed and they persevered.

The intellectual part of me engaged with the history here – then rebelled - and became confused - because I could not really feel the emotion of it all.

Just as detached, but with my mind fully engaged, I have felt the gentle tug of the sea at 'D'Day's Omaha beach in France, and walked the three hundred metres of open sand toward the ruined concrete bunker fortifications on the shore – past the decaying floating docks that arrived here for the landing. Travelled on to Ste-Mère-Églis where they still have a representation of a paratrooper who was caught on the church tower when the invasion first started.

I have walked across the bridges at Mayenne where the tanks crossed before manoeuvring quickly into battle formation, to open the front into Europe.

I have walked the battle fields of Hastings, of Culloden Moor, of the ground that saw the last great clash of the Samurai in Japan – the battlefields of Cortez in South America – the battlefields of the American War of Independence – The Civil War and the Indian conflicts in North America.

I have walked several battlefields in Australia, and many other places, and always with a sense of detachment. Even walking in the battlefields of Viet Nam could not bring out the emotions that I felt I should have.

I am not cold hearted –

I have screamed and cried at the blundering stupidity of it all. I have never felt hatred toward anyone, but, I have often been in a cold fury while contemplating the death – the pain – the cruelty – the despair – the overwhelming sadness during and after - long after, the conflict is over. My Father died from lingering war injuries when I was very young – I have felt the sadness and abiding pain that has lasted over the years. I have been a Reservist in both the Air Force and the Army. I have insight into what the military suffers.

Our Defence Forces selflessly provide a capability that can be the difference between speaking Australian or some enforced foreign language - with loss of freedom, and the imposition of different life values and customs. Our Defence Forces provide this capability day in and day out – relentlessly.

I can unashamedly say that I love and respect them all – past – present and future.

From that incredible landing came the wonderful Australian and New Zealand name ANZAC. The name embraces us all, and unites us further as the years float on.

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People self isolating, loo paper panic, fresh meat and veg selling out, pensioners only shopping times. What a crazy and scary world we are living in at present.

My mother would have laughed and would have rehashed stories of the Second World War and rationing. What a very different world it was then. No internet, no freezers, no long life milk and certainly no television to ease the drudgery of home isolating.


So how do we stay positive, fit, well and uplifted? Cooking helps. So this month I look at tips and hints to help us through this worrying time.


Buy pulses in 1kg packs from health stores or ethnic grocers. There are a many of these in Shepparton and not only are their dried products super fresh because they are turned over regularly by their regular customers they are also very cost effective. With chick peas look for the Ord River Australian brand - super good. I soak the whole kilo overnight in plenty of cold water. Next day drain them and divide into 2 portions. One lot I place in snap lock bags marked clearly – soaked only

These are perfect, defrosted, for falafel or if adding to a stew which will be braised. The other portion I cook in plenty of unsalted water until tender. (Cooking with salt tends to toughen them) cooking time may vary but approximately 50-60 minutes to have firm but cooked chickpeas. These I drain and cool then freeze in snap lock bags marked as cooked. Defrosted these are great in hummus, salads, or soups. The flavour and texture profile is so much better than tinned and they take up far less space in the pantry and more importantly have much better value and nutrition - being a non factory processed product. Similarly any of the pulse family can be managed in the same way. Just be wary of lentils which have a much faster cooking time, especially red lentils which really just need to be rinsed and then quick cooked in water as for Dahl.

Mince has been a hot topic of over panic buying. Make your own. It is so much better, you know what is in it and you have total control of the fat content. If you have a mincer or a mincer attachment to a food processor or mixer all well and good. But it is easy enough to make it with two sharp chefs or kitchen knives. Just cut into small cubes then with a knife in each hand chop on a sturdy chopping board until chopped to the texture you require. It takes a bit of practice but is great for getting rid on any frustrations or angst !! It's also cheaper. I usually make it from chuck or gravy beef mixed with either pork scotch or pork shoulder. I use a ratio of 2 parts beef to one part pork and trust me it makes the best Bologna (Bolognese) sauce and brilliant hamburgers. Again I make mince and sauce in bulk and snap lock freeze in portions, clearly marked with the date. My bolognese sauce has about equal amounts of meat to vegetables, namely carrots, celery, tomatoes, onions and leeks and of course a good dose of chopped garlic. Once made the sauce can be changed into many different dishes. I add cooked and chopped spinach with Indian spices and chickpeas for a nourishing and low budget dinner. A portion of sauce mixed with cooked borlotti or canellini beans and topped with mashed sweet potatoes, then baked, is delicious. Mixed with cooked black beans, Szechwan pepper, sweet soy sauce and chilli gives an Asian twist. Really it is limitless.

And if all else fails there is always the sweet side of life. Bake a cake or biscuits and think about an indulgent dessert to boost the endorphins and cheer oneself





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Garden Daze

The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago - the next best time is now.



A Summer to remember has been replaced by a more benevolent Autumn

Some suggestions for the winter garden:

Celery (*Apium graveolens*) is a marshland plant in the family Apiaceae that has been cultivated as a vegetable since antiquity. Interestingly Celery contains *apigenin* a molecule that is currently being studied for its anti-cancer properties.



A shallow-rooted plant with a high demand for water and nutrients, Celery needs a moist but well-drained organically rich soil. Water and nutrient stress will lead to dry fibrous stalks.

Last year - noticing that one of our *wicking beds* had the drain outlet

rather high, resulting in perpetually damp soil (so long as I remembered to top up the bed in time) I planted the bed out with celery and I was very pleased - it grew well - and *no hollow stalks!*

So - it would seem - if it is planted at the right time and given the attention to feeding and watering it requires, success is possible with this somewhat difficult vegetable.

In cool and temperate regions, sow late winter to early spring, and again in late summer to early autumn. Choose a sheltered position as strong winds can dry out and damage the plants. I put a cover of shade cloth over the bed. This must have made the plants happy as there were no ill effects from frosts.

A half-barrow load of compost or well-rotted manure per square metre worked into the top 10-15 cm layer of soil will improve drainage while retaining moisture around the root zone.

Work in a handful of balanced organic fertiliser evenly per square metre and apply liquid seaweed and fish emulsion every couple of weeks.

Blanching - If you are planning to eat your celery raw - and prefer paler stalks - when plants are close to harvesting, tie the stalks loosely, then wrap the stems with thick newspaper, leaving the leaves sticking out at the top. The stalks will be pale and ready to harvest in around 2-3 weeks.

Harvesting

Celery bunches can be harvested whole after 14 weeks or, (my preferred method), you can harvest individual stalks as you need them.



Here is a recipe for a quick and tasty celery soup

This can also be used as a base for any recipe which calls for tinned condensed -

Cream of Celery Soup

1/4 cup butter
1 onion - finely chopped
2 cups finely chopped celery
1 clove garlic, minced
1/3 cup plain flour
1 1/2 cups chicken stock
1 1/2 cups milk
Salt & pepper



Melt Butter in medium saucepan and cook onion, celery and garlic until soft and translucent (5-7 mins)

Add the flour and cook 1 min

Add chicken stock, milk and S/P to taste

Stir until smooth,

Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer slowly, uncovered for 20 to 30 minutes.

If using for base for other recipes, this soup will keep in the fridge for at least 3 - 4 days.

Growing Parsnips - can be a bit tricky

In our area - March is the last chance to plant until Spring - Parsnips love a good frost and do their best in cold temperate areas..so if you want some home grown Parsnips to enjoy - **now is the time!**

Always sow fresh seed - if your seed is more than a year old - buy some fresh from a good mail order supplier.

They like a relatively poor loose soil, fork over thoroughly and **never add fertilizer before sowing!**

Keep the bed evenly moist until germination. Parsnips are slow to germinate and can take up to 3 or 4 weeks. Cover the seedbed with shade cloth until the first set of leaves appear.

Control weeds and keep the moisture as consistent as possible during the growing process otherwise the roots can split lengthways and rot.

So good luck with your planting and may you reap the rewards of deliciously sweet roasted Parsnips.

Let a couple of parsnips go to seed, then plant this fresh seed straight into the new year's bed.

A Winter Veg Garden depends a lot on what is planted in March - try:

Over about 4 decades of farming, we have had a sense of security of place. Let the rest of the world do as it liked, we had our water, our septic, our veggie garden, our well-stocked pantry and chest freezer, and rather a lot of sheep. Back when we lived almost an hour out of Swan Hill, with some dodgy dirt road involved, we only went to town every 2 or 3 weeks.

The feeling of security was not paranoia, but a consciousness at odd times like the Great Wakool River Flood... which never did eventuate, but while it looked as though we'd be cut off for even longer than usual, we stocked up a little more. Something to reflect upon, when the prospect of staying at home for a fortnight has grown women wrestling in the aisles over toilet paper, and shelves bare of pasta. I mean, a little bit of pasta goes a very long way. Geez... townies.

And now I am a 'towny'. Dependant on others for our water.. my word there's a lot of high-pressure water flies out of those taps! One's attitude changes, without a mental estimation of just how much water is on hand, and so much of the stuff keen to escape the pipes. Australian communities probably need some structural changes, to enhance the psychology of water saving.

And we are so close to the shops! Jolly nice, so long as there's something in there, aside from lunatics fighting over dunny rolls.

Even on the farm at White Gate, just 13km from town, we were ready for the apocalypse. But now the apocalypse is here, and we don't have any sheep to kill. Luckily we don't eat as much meat as we used to. I wonder how many hoarders will learn the hard way, that mince has a finite fridge-life?

Toilet paper doesn't go off (so long as there are no leaky taps about, and those who respect their water supply are pretty careful about taps). Also, those who run their own septic tanks, are careful about what gets flushed. Sometimes a visitor to a farm needs a quiet word about just how much toilet paper is vanishing from the roll; and that is concern for the pipes and the septic tank, not want of paper. I reckon, if everybody had to go out with a shovel, and leave a discreet deposit in the paddock, they might not be so carefree in their use of toilet paper. In our old age, for all that we live near the shops, we are starting to worry about re-stocking our supply when the time arrives.

Veggie gardens are back in fashion. A young woman on the news showed her seed pack, ready to save her in case of 2 week isolation. (Um... wot?)

In recent times the bulk of the human race has congregated in cities, commuting packed like sardines, living hand-to-mouth and dependant on the supermarket they visit every five minutes.

It was never going to end well.

The monthly meeting of Benalla Shire Council was held on Monday.

CORRESPONDENCE.

From Defence Department, acknowledging receipt of a petition re treatment of soldiers by the Railway Department, which will receive attention.-Received

From District Land Office, asking if there are any areas of Crown land in the shire that would be suitable to settle returned soldiers on. - Held over until next meeting, and councillors who are aware of any land that is available to hand in list to the secretary.

From Millar & Co.. Pty. Ltd, re boiler supplied by them, which after inspection by their engineer was found to have nothing the matter with it, the trouble being owing to the building-in, and stating that satisfaction will never be obtained from the boiler whilst the compressor is in its present condition.-Mr. Jeffrey said that the compressor was now in perfect order.

From Benalla Agricultural and Pastoral Society, asking that Wednesday, 4th October next, may be proclaimed a public holiday throughout the shire for their show. Granted.

From E. Lindholms, re the bad state of a small piece of road leading from R. Walker's to Bert Walker's property, which is in a very bad state and almost Impassable, and asking that same be repaired. - Attended to.

From Robt. Twamley, asking permission to remove three (3) useless trees leaning over his fence, between Lurg and Glenrowan, where he is about to wire-net. Granted.

From Maria Quinn and Geo. F. Chivers, re the bad state of the road known as Quinn's lane, and asking that the engineer inspect with a view of having the bad portions formed. - Engineer to inspect and report.

From H. D. Hamilton, re two pieces of the Fern Hills and Toombullup road that badly want repairing, as there are wash-outs getting worse every day, and undertaking to do the work properly if authorised to do so, - Left in the hands of engineer.

Benalla-Tatong Railway - Mr. Norman pointed out to us that we had a report from his officers opposing the siding near Mrs T. Cowan's but eventually he promised to obtain another report; but told us that if a siding were put in, the road leading thereto would have to be made trafficable. We would therefore advise that the Country Roads Board be approached to take this road over as a developmental road, for it would be a serious matter if the council had to bear the whole cost.

Contractor Brown has been instructed to effect urgent repairs to M'Intosh's bridge, and repairs arranged for on road near Burns', Samaria, and Factory lane, Swanpool.-Received.
Repairs have been effected to roads near Cooper's and M'Donald's Emu Bridge.- Received.

SUCK it UP

SEPTIC PUMP OUTS

Why is it important to pump my septic tank out regularly?

Over time scum and sludge layers build up in your septic tank, eventually limiting the amount of available liquid. This does not allow the septic tank to perform one of its basic functions - to allow for settling of solids below the outlet level.

The waste will then flow directly on to the next part of the system untreated. If this situation persists, the scum and sludge will flow through to the distribution field, eventually causing blockages and malfunction - a messy, smelly and costly exercise to repair.

It is recommended that septic tanks are pumped out every 3 - 5 years

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
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What's Happening at Molly Rose?

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

ANDRE RIEU, LOVED AND SCORNE

Andre Rieu is a Dutch violinist, in case you haven't noticed, who tours the world with his orchestra and entourage bringing massive classical music concerts to those now mostly past the humungous excesses of the rock concert. Loved by many and scorned by some in the 'loftier' music circles he has tapped into a need by the populace for huge and highly entertaining musical spectacles catering to the middle ground lovers of fine orchestral music.

We are seeing this very type of art separation being played out with the Benalla Wall to Wall festival where 'popular art' is leaving our art gallery out of the limelight, although the gallery may be the only exhibitor of a street artist, Sofle, this year because they installed his work well before the corona virus emergency struck. Like so many events this year's Wall to Wall is cancelled.

It is immaterial whether the music establishment approves of Rieu or not because his momentum has become unstoppable. His popularity reminds me of the movie "The Sound of Music" which many arty people refused to ever watch simply because it was so popular, strangely ironic is it not that 'popularity' for some equals mediocre. When in Salzburg and having time to spare I with some trepidation decided to take The Sound of Music bus tour. Due to the perfect weather, fabulous scenery, great guide and good company it was the highlight of my holiday.

Every person has art ability and appreciation within themselves whether they are trained or not. The truest artists are children and the naïve who just paint, sing or practice their art straight from the heart. The oft ridiculed statement "I may not know much about art but I know what I like" applies to such as these.

Speaking of fun and Andre's concerts feature novel activities with actors and the audience which engage them in the experience and provides so much added enjoyment to the events. Activities such as a bull chasing a woman who is dressed all in red around the stadium to the music of Esapana, or a massive cloud of 'snow' falling on the audience during the playing of the "Snow Waltz."

Going by the quality of his musicians and singers, Rieu attracts some of the world's best performers and they

This version from the Rieu stable is just sublime and it suited Mirusia's voice perfectly. She has gone on to bigger things now with her own concert organisation separate from Rieu's.
