Most unusually, this summer had very high humidity but, having put airconditioning in every room, we have been very comfortable. One of the first things we did was put solar panels on the roof. They feed back so much power that we haven't had an electricity bill for about twenty -two months. The panels have paid for themselves already.

Life is good here and very convenient. The doctor and chemist are only about a kilometre away and the main shopping centre is four k's. We have joined the local U3A and are making quite a few new friends. Sallie has joined two walking groups and goes on an hours walk four times a week. The walks are at about 6am as it gets too hot later in the day. Sallie took this photo at Farnborough beach on one of her walks last year. Unfortunately, there is a lot of crime in Qld so we have to keep the doors locked and there are security grids on every window and external door. However, the good outweighs the bad. There are dozens of cafes and restaurants here and we go out for dinner a lot. We also go out for breakfast about twice a month. We had to get used to having neighbours very close, like five meters away rather than the five hundred meters we enjoyed in Tatong.

Benalla Standard 11th April 1924:

TATONG BRANCH V.F.U.

On Saturday evening last, the Tatong branch of the V.F.U. held their monthly meeting. The President (Mr. A. Harrison) occupied the chair, and gave a lengthy report of the annual conference at Bendigo. He stated that the arguments became very heated over the Composite Ministry, he voted in favour of the admission of the Press during the debate thereon, as he considered, the influence of the Press was necessary, but the majority favoured exclusion. For a day and a half the question was discussed. Eventually a compromise suggested by the Hon. P. G. Stewart (Federal Minister for Railways), limiting the present argument to the existing State Parliament, was carried, the feeling being that the Victorian Farmers' Union should thoroughly safeguard its identity as a union. He also dwelt on the favourable reception that was accorded to the scheme of pooling the rabbit skins, as already outlined in the "Standard." He was also fortunate in seeing the Hon. Mr. Old (Minister for Railways), and asked him what had been done in connection with the deputation's request last December, from the Benalla to Tatong Railway Trust, the shire president (Cr. Walker), and the Taxpayers' Association (Messrs Coghill and A. Harrison). The Minister informed Mr. Harrison that he could tell him nothing, as the file had not

come to hand from the Benalla to Tatong Railway Trust. This matter was then fully discussed. Messrs Coghill and Harrison could not explain the delay, as the chairman of the Trust, (Comr. Walker) had promised the Minister that the request would be put in writing and forwarded. The meeting, instructed the secretary to write to the Trust, and endeavour to find out the reason for the delay. On the motion of Messrs Gardiner and T. McCauley, Mr. A. Harrison was accorded a hearty vote of thanks for the lengthy report. The shire secretary (Mr. Knox) states that the report by Cr. Walker, who attended the deputation, was as follows: " The association was requested by the Minister to put their request in writing and forward it to him, giving full particulars, when the matter would be considered". This they agreed to do. -Ed. S. J

The Argus Melbourne 12th April 1924:

TATONG ESTATE, BENALLA. (abridged) The sale is reported on account of Mr G. L. Lane, of the Tatong estate. It comprises 1,732 acres of rich, heavy carrying, fattening and agricultural land all highly improved with a double frontage to the Hollands branch of the Broken River, which runs through the property The estate, which is considered to be the best property in that favoured district, comprises the homestead portion and the pick of the original Tatong Station and it has always been noted for best quality export limbs and heavy yields from agriculture.

Benalla Standard 15th April 1924: QUEEN OF RAILWAYS.

A very enjoyable concert and dance was held at Tatong on Friday night, when over 80 were present. A strong contingent arrived from Benalla, and the various items were rendered by Mrs,

Maunders, Misses Goulding, Youngman, V, Egan and M, Egan, Messrs Richardson, McIntyre, McNamara, Darcy, and H. Williams. Messrs L. Ogden (piano) and Barry (violin) supplied excellent accompaniments, and dancing was indulged until after midnight. The local ladles' committee provided a splendid supper.

Benalla Standard 18th April 1924: TENNIS.

At the conclusion of the round of home and away matches of the Swanpool District Tennis Association, the competing clubs were placed in the following order — Lima, Samaria, Lima

East, Swanpool, Tatong, and Waverley. In the semifinal matches Swanpool defeated Samaria by 61 games to 49, and Lima defeated Lima East by 60 games to 49. In the final match, which was played on the Waverley court on 5th April, Lima defeated Swanpool by 70 games to 41, thereby winning the premiership.

Benalla Standard 29th April 1924:

FAREWELL AT TATONG.(abridged)

On Thursday evening a farewell evening was; tendered to Mr. J. W. Riggall, the head teacher of the Tatong State School. Dancing, interspersed with songs by Master and Miss Newton, Master Geo. and Miss M. Thompson, Mrs. T. Wilson. Mrs. Moon (encored), and Mr. Newton (encored) filled the evening's entertainment. The Chairman of the school committee (Mr. T. McCauley), in a short

speech said that the committee, parents and residents were there to wish Mr. Riggall farewell and their good wishes. He had been Tatong close on four years, and during that time had done his best for the school, and had also helped in sport and other things for the district. Mr. D. H. Coghill also spoke on the progress that had been made in the school since Mr. Riggall's arrival. Thanks to the school committee, with his assistance, they had now a school thoroughly up-to-date, and able to accommodate 50 children. Mr. Coghill was well satisfied with the manner and the conscientiousness with which he trained his child. Mr. J, Monaghan supported the remarks of the previous speakers, and referred to Mr. Riggall's assistance in public matters. The Chairman then presented the guest with a nice travelling rug. Master Roy Beard, the senior student, in a very nice speech, presented a leather collar box on behalf of the children. Riggall thanked them all for their very nice presents and their good wishes.

Floor Replaced

After the Tatong Market and More event in early November, a member of the public put a foot through the floor in the function room. An emergency meeting was held by the Rec Reserve committee in which is was decided to replace a number of the flooring panels. However, upon further investigations of the floor, it was found that the white ant infestation was so bad that the whole floor needed to be replaced. A quick meeting decided to replace the previous timber sub-structure with steel making the job much more comprehensive than first thought.

In stepped local engineer Dennis Hevey, who agreed to project manage the job with the support of Ron Morris to install the new panels. We were very lucky in gaining the help of another local engineer Chris Gaudion, who not only donated his valuable time, but also sourced steel at rock bottom price from North East Steel.


Time was of the essence as we had the Christmas function and a local reunion already booked for December. A couple of well attended working bees were held to get rid of the sub-structure and the flooring (what the white ants hadn't already taken). Along with our normal volunteers we were able to gain technical help from Mick Gaudion and Joe Hakkeness on the timber structure while Dennis Hevey and Chris Gaudion looked after the steel structure. Steve Clarkson was able to get the MDF flooring sheets donated from D&R Henderson. Mike Larkin and Leigh O'Gorman also completed all of the electrical work in relocating the air conditioning units. The job proceeded at lightning speed and was completed in time for the Christmas BBQ. A very big thank you to everyone involved who gave their time willingly. A special thanks to Dennis Hevey for his huge effort enabling us to complete the job on time.


Tatong Community Investment Fund - Community Meeting Tuesday 9th April @7:30pm

A Community Meeting for the sub-committee of the Tatong Community Centre and Recreation Reserve is being held to review and formulate policy to manage the community investment account. This meeting will be held at the Tatong Community Centre and Recreation Reserve on Tuesday 9th April at 7:30pm. Representatives of all community groups and interested locals are cordially welcome and encouraged to attend.

After the closure of the Tatong Primary School, the management of the former school pine plantation was passed to the Tatong Community Centre and Recreation Reserve. Since then, the mature pines were harvested, and the plantation site prepped and planted again with new pine. HVP Victorian Plantations completed this work as well as weed and wattle control. This work has been authorised by the Committee of Management of the Tatong Community Centre and Recreation Reserve. Their role in the management of the pine plantation and its financials is ongoing. Money from the sale of the original pines was placed in a community investment account under the custodianship of the Recreation Reserve Committee of Management. To date, some of the funds from this community investment account have been allocated to the Recreation Reserve and the Tatong Memorial Hall to

TITANIC MUSEUM EXHIBITION

My friend and I travelled down to Melbourne recently to visit the Titanic exhibition at the Melbourne Museum.

Fortunately for us it was the day before Vline decided to go on strike, so our train journey from Seymour & return was uneventful. I could go on about how frustrating our Victorian rail services are, but that is for another story.

We travelled by tram to the Museum in Carlton & found a quiet spot within the building to eat some lunch & have a coffee. Our viewing time was 12.30 and as they obviously stagger these times there was no queue to negotiate. What a change! On showing our admission details, we were both given a Boarding Pass to enter the exhibition. Each of these passes has different details on the back featuring passengers and their details. Mine was for a Miss Marie Grice Young, 36 and travelling from New York to Washington DC as a First Class passenger. She

was travelling back to Washington, where she was a music instructor to President Theodore Roosevelt's daughter. Unfortunately it doesn't say whether or not she was a survivor, but I'm presuming not.

The exhibition took us from the building of the Titanic in Belfast, through the beautiful interior and a glimpse of what life onboard was like, to the events leading up to the hitting of the iceberg and subsequent rescue efforts. It ended with a detailed outline of the quite remarkable salvage operation.

The different rooms showcase artefacts and large poster boards giving details of the ship and how events unfolded. One of the most interesting was the cross-section of the ship. It was certainly state of the art with a gym, sauna, smoking rooms, cafes and many other fascinating features. There were mock displays of 1st class and 3rd class cabins and even a real iceberg.



Invasion of Panic Andi Stevenson

"Hairy Panic" is a great name for a grass. Indeed, it would be a splendid name for a dog. (But not for a baby.) We've seen a fair bit of 'panic' since we came to live downwind of the airport. On the right day, the stuff begins to drop out of the sky. I had understood it to be a native, and so felt a little forgiving of it's messy habits.

Panicum effusum is indeed native to this land. But recently I learnt that what I thought of as native panic might be any of the introduced forms.

There is witchgrass (Panicum capillare) and Hillman's panic grass (Panicum hillmanii).

Hillman's panic grass is a noxious weed introduced from the US to South Australia and Victoria in the 1900s. "It is distinguished by slightly stiffer panicles," which is easy for them to say. A NSW report reckoned that 95% of the panic-grass in the Riverina was identified as Hillman's, and only 5% as native. P. hillmanii as been linked to kangaroo blindness and poisoning.



A GRDC publication states: "Panicum capillare, Panicum hillmanii, and Panicum effusum are very difficult to distinguish in the field." Great. When a larger head began blowing overhead a few

years back, I was told that was "African Love Grass" (which sounds like an aphrodisiac, but I suspect it isn't.)

Trying to garner more knowledge online, I am told: "African lovegrass (Eragrostis curvula): The mature seed head looks similar to that of many native panic grasses, such as Hairy panic or Blowaway grass, but typically only half the size." So the big heads are not African Love grass. However, the imported noxious Hillman's panic is described as: "Very similar in appearance to the local hairy panic (P. effusum) but is bigger, almost like it is on steroids. It's leaf blades are always wider than 5mm and frequently over 1cm while those of P. effusum are usually less than 5mm wide. The seed head is also fairly densely packed in comparison to the more open seed head of P. effusum."

To add to the conundrum, 'Charles Sturt University (CSU) Professor Leslie Weston said, "There are 38 species of panic grasses in Australia, including nine exotic species." So what is the situation here in the North East? Who to ask? The last time I took a plant in to the Dept. of Frequent Name Changes, the youth I spoke to didn't realise he'd waded through swathes of it in the car-park. A Queensland document adds to the panic with, "E. paniculmis also appears to hybridise with members of the complex [African Love Grass], but this species is not yet recorded in Australia." So ... mutant panic is on the horizon? Note that the seeds of these grasses are easily spread by mowers, and in hay. There is nowhere to hide. If some mechanically-minded entrepreneur could turn an old tanker into a Very Large Vacuum Cleaner, there could be a business opening for sucking the suckers up.


IN MY SECOND CHILDHOOD, IT'S A THRILL TO ANNOUNCE A MAJOR BIRTHDAY

"Davy Falls", Tatong (c1890)

Trawling Trove (http://trove.nla.gov.au, National Library of Australia) in a moment of leisure, turned up this aged travel snap. The details are "Davy Falls, Tatong", published in 1890 by W. H. Ferguson, "negative : glass ; 12.1 x 16.6 cm. (half plate)". The original is of extraordinarily high resolution; one can zoom in and see that the valley floor is covered in fallen trees.

This photo, taken from a hill on one side of the valley, is surely a hill with a creek to get the name "Davy Falls" (*Unless W.H.'s mate Davy fell over just here.*)

Does anyone know of Davy Falls? A property owned by any Davy's?

Would anyone recognise the layout?

Below is a cropped section of the hill line. W.H. Ferguson travelled this area as a part of his collection, "Gippsland and the Victorian high country", and there are other gems, including one of "Sams Falls", now known as Lex's Falls, on Knapper's place.

Tom Arnold of Benalla Council gave a run-down on community grants, at the Tatong Heritage Group bimonthly meeting on March 18th. The quick-response grant is available all year, and the larger annual Community Grant closes in late April. Tom described the range in challenges for correct applications, but was

enthusiastic for this form of community support to be well utilized.

In local history, Chick Walker explained that 'Fern Hills', 'Toombullup' and 'Hollands Creek' were different names for the same school, State School #2891. The tennis courts were opened in 1912, and in 1941 the school was moved to Boggy Creek.

The old building which Faye & Greg Crowe recall from their childhood had been called "The Old School," but could not have been a registered state school. Further investigation needed there.

Chick also observed that funds were raised for a Fern Hills hall, which was never built.

The group sorted final plans for the unveiling of 3 more story-boards (information panels) this coming Friday March 22nd. Benalla Mayor Danny Claridge will be the guest of honour.

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Many years ago in the area of Kilfeera lived two little girls, born in the 1930s their names were Helen and her younger sister Joan. They lived an idyllic life on a lovely farm called Braebank, with an immaculately kept house in a beautiful garden along the Ryans Creek and each day made their way down the creek along the Kilfeera Road towards Benalla to go to school at Emu Bridge (10 kms or 6 miles) either by riding their bikes or ponies depending on the weather or sometimes in the jig driven by their father.

Their father Jack Bunworth had grown up at a property called Heatherlea on the Holland Creek, closer to Benalla, where he lived with his mother and his stepfather Mr Kemp. Mr Kemp who adopted Jack, then left him this property when he died.

Jack was a hard working young man and by the time he was in his mid twenties he had purchased a very productive block of land near Tatong in the Rothesay district. He sold this block when he was 27 and purchased the more substantial property of Braebank in 1924 and then married his wife Lorna and they settled for a life of farming there.

He also purchased a bare block of some 200 acres along the Holland Creek on the corner of the Emu Bridge and Kilfeera Road shortly after this time and used this paddock to finish fattening bullocks before they were walked the 10kms into Benalla to be put on rail vans to be sold at Newmarket.

It was opposite the front gate of Holland Park, where Jack's grandson, David (Jex) Elford, now lives that the Emu Bridge School was located. Here Jack would drop off Helen and Joan for school in the jig and work the day at the block (then called Rob's) then collect them at the end of the day and take them home.

When Jack's eldest daughter Helen married she was gifted Heatherlea with her sister Joan. Helen and her new husband Tom Elford moved there after the birth of their second child, David. Tom a city boy from Melbourne had purchased a farming property at Meadow Creek near Moyhu several years earlier as a single man when he completed his farming diploma at Dookie Ag College. Being quite a remote location, it made sense to move closer to Helen's family and be closer to a larger town being Benalla.

After major renovations were completed at the Heatherlea homestead in 1958 the family moved there and farmed there until the year 2000.

Last year we refericed sections of the property at Holland Park and removed strainer posts that were put in 100 years ago, sawn by hand and other parts of the fence line put in over 60 years ago when Jex was a small boy.

Jex recalls stories from his grandmother and mother that when a stock sale went well in Benalla, Jack would send his horse home and he would stay the night in town to celebrate. Lorna would know when she saw the horse arrive home with stirrup irons up and reins threaded through, that he had not fallen off and that it had been a good sale! It seems incredible that in the year of 2024 it marks the 100th year of 3 generations of one family working this block of land here at Holland Park and being the custodians of a very special part of our district. This story is not an isolated one and I would love to hear the history of many other properties in our district especially through stories in the Tatong Tattler. Certainly up and down the Holland and Ryan Creek there are many well held properties and parcels of land and I am sure each has their own unique story to tell. Georgina Burston



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

Gawn to Town

I've sent off my dog crate to Molyullah fair. I'll never need it any more, and that is hard to bear. No more Kelpies, no more motorbikes. :((No more lamb-marking, yipee!) I had my dog-box fastened to the rack of my Honda 125. My first red kelpie, Bernadette, used to start off with her chin leaning on my shoulder, then gradually move forward until she was climbing up my back.

She only abandoned ship once; we were moving cattle to a further paddock, in the autumn, and on the way we passed an irrigation layout with some pasture still in it. Well, the theory was that we would pass by, but that wasn't the way the cattle saw it.

I did my diagonal zooms back and forth over the large irrigation banks, yelling, beeping the horn, and getting progressively more annoyed. Then the balance of the bike changed, and I realised Bernadette was no longer behind me; the expression on her face said excitement was one thing, but this time I'd gone too far.

I never used Det to shift cattle. A mighty sheep dog; with cows she was very loud and brave in the dog box, or behind a fence. But when faced with a ton of angry Hereford, she felt discretion was the better part of valour.

The dog crate was an old steel milk crate, and came from a clearing sale in Swan Hill. I lined it with a gentleman's jacket from the op-shop, sewn into place with a bagging needle and baler twine. This made the crate comfy for the dog, and the pockets came in handy too. Every few



years the jacket needed replacing, but there was never any lack of oldfashioned jackets.

I had to put a small partition across the back of the crate. This was handy for carrying electric fence tools etc, but was mainly to stop the dog (or dogs) from sitting right down the back, and unbalancing the bike.
